

Through a poet's eyes: Dunedin, City of Literature

About this course

Three days of inspirational fieldwork followed by a two day poetry workshop

Dunedin has long been an inspiring city for writers. This course will nurture your muse and exercise your writing muscles, combining workshop sessions with inspirational fieldwork. Using poetry as our guide, we'll spend three days physically exploring Dunedin's literary history. We'll write poems of our own in response to the landscape, architecture, climate and culture. Poets we'll trace as we move around the city include Charles Brasch, Ruth Dallas, Janet Frame, Hone Tuwhare, Cilla McQueen, Vincent O'Sullivan, David Eggleton, Emma Neale, Rhian Gallagher, Sue Wootton and Fiona Farrell.

These three days of literary fieldwork will be followed by a two day poetry workshop, based on campus.
